
#### YEAR 11 'STEP INTO SUCCESS' EVENING: A LAUNCHPAD FOR GCSE ACHIEVEMENT

Under the expert guidance of certified professionals, students gained practical experience and the confidence to act swiftly and effectively in the event of a cardiac emergency.

Restart a Heart Day serves as a vital awareness campaign, highlighting the life-saving potential of CPR. With prompt intervention, the chances of survival during a cardiac arrest increase dramatically, and the program has empowered our students to make a difference in critical moments.

The school extends its gratitude to the Yorkshire Ambulance Service for their expertise and dedication to community health and safety. Their collaboration has equipped our students with skills that have the potential to save lives for years to come.

#### A JOURNEY THROUGH HISTORY: FIRST WORLD WAR BATTLEFIELDS VISIT

In November, students from The Skipton Academy visited historic First World War battlefields and memorials in Belgium and France. The trip offered a profound insight into the human cost of war and the importance of remembrance, bringing history to life in a way no textbook could.

The journey began at Essex Farm Cemetery in Ieper, Belgium, where students reflected on "In Flanders Fields," written by Lieutenant-Colonel Dr. John McCrae at this site. They learned about the role of the Advanced Dressing Station there, gaining an appreciation for the resilience of wartime medics.

At the St Julien Canadian Memorial, students explored the bravery of soldiers during the first use of chemical warfare, while the Langemark German Cemetery offered a somber perspective on loss, with over 44,000 German soldiers buried there.

In the Somme, the Thiepval Memorial conveyed the staggering scale of loss with over 72,000 names of missing soldiers, and Vimy Ridge highlighted the innovative tactics and sacrifices of Canadian forces, symbolised by maple tree tributes.

The trip provided students with a deeper understanding of the realities of war and inspired them to carry forward the lessons of history. The Skipton Academy thanks the organisers for making this meaningful experience possible.





### TSA TRIUMPHS AT THE DALES CUP CROSS COUNTRY EVENT



# SPORTS LEADERS SUPPORTING LOCAL PRIMARY SCHOOLS


Our talented Sports Leaders have been busy supporting a range of events across our local primary schools, helping to inspire younger students and promote a love for sport.




