Why Attendance Matters?

Attending school every day helps children develop not just academically but socially and emotionally. It ensures they benefit from direct teaching, class discussions, group work, and the structure of the school day. Even a single day's absence can mean missing out on key learning, which can be hard to fully catch up on.

According to the Department for Education, pupils with higher attendance levels generally achieve better GCSE results, while those who are persistently absent (missing 10% or more of school days) are less likely to succeed academically and are at greater risk of becoming disengaged.

The Impact of Missing School

Absences from school, whether due to illness or other reasons, can add up quickly. A child who misses just one day every two weeks misses the equivalent of a whole year of school by the time they leave secondary education. This not only affects their academic progress but can also disrupt friendships and reduce their confidence and motivation.

Term-Time Holidays: Why They Matter More Than You Think

Taking holidays during term time may seem harmless, especially if it's just a few days. However, these absences can have a serious impact. Schools in England are not permitted to authorise holidays during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. Taking children out of school for holidays can lead to:

- Gaps in learning that are difficult to bridge.
- Missed assessments or key coursework.
- Disruption to class continuity and peer learning.

Local authorities may issue fines for unauthorised term-time absences, as part of efforts to reduce persistent absenteeism and encourage families to prioritise education.

How Parents and Carers Can Help

Families play a crucial role in ensuring children attend school regularly. Here are a few ways to help:

- Create a consistent routine: Bedtime and morning routines can make a big difference.
- Plan holidays and medical/dental appointments during school breaks: Use the published term dates to book time away.
- Stay informed: Communicate with school staff if your child is unwell or if there are issues affecting attendance.
- Promote the value of education: Talk positively about school and learning at home.

Good attendance is not just a school expectation, it's a life skill. It teaches children responsibility, time management, and the importance of commitment. As a school community, we are here to support every pupil to thrive, and that starts with being present.

Annual C&C Week









During the last week of this term, we proudly hosted our annual Challenge and Celebration Week, an ambitious and diverse programme of enrichment designed to provide every student with memorable, meaningful and character-building experiences outside of the traditional classroom environment.

The week, which brought together hundreds of students and staff across all year groups, was a resounding success. Packed with residentials, outdoor adventures, cultural visits, creative workshops, and in-school challenges.

Each year group followed a unique programme tailored to their stage of learning and development:

- Year 7 enjoyed "The Big Mix" a carousel of exciting activities including Clip 'n' Climb, Ilkley Cinema,
 Allerthorpe Park water sports, and a high-rope adventure at Go Ape Blackburn. The experience
 concluded with a team-based Problem Solving Day on site.
- Year 8 embarked on "**The Big Trip**" a four-day residential visit to London, packed with culture and challenge. Highlights included the Science and Natural History Museums, the Tower of London, a Thames River cruise, a West End production of The Lion King, and a final-day visit to London Zoo.
- Year 9 headed into the Lakes for "The Big Outdoors" a residential at Hawes End, Cumbria, where students embraced canoeing, ghyll scrambling, climbing, and mountain walking in the breathtaking surroundings of Derwent Water.
- Year 10 experienced "The Big Work Experience" joining a wide range of local and regional employers to gain valuable insight into the world of work, grow in independence, and explore future career possibilities.

- Key Stage 3 students also had opportunities to take part in themed activities including:
 - The Big Ride: a carousel of day trips including Blackpool Pleasure Beach, Bewerley Park outdoor centre, SpeedKix, Matrix Bowling, and Skipton Cinema.
 - **The Big Skipton Spectacular:** local enrichment activities such as tree-top climbing, cookery challenges, indoor mini-golf, and laser quest.
 - **The Big Task:** an engaging, in-school challenge rotation including STEM tasks, physical activities, problem-solving workshops and creative projects delivered by school staff and external facilitators.
- Key Stage 4 students were also able to broaden their horizons on international experiences:
 - **The Big Moroccan Adventure:** a 14-day expedition exploring cultural, geographical and humanitarian elements of Morocco, including a trek through the Atlas Mountains and community service in rural villages.
 - **The Big Cornish Canvas:** an arts-focused residential exploring Cornwall's vibrant creative landscape through photography, pottery, and design.
 - **The Big Parisian Adventure:** a culturally rich trip to Paris, including sightseeing at Versailles and the Eiffel Tower and a magical day at Disneyland Paris.

The purpose of Challenge and Celebration Week is rooted in The Skipton Academy's mission to provide a well-rounded education. These experiences help students develop vital personal skills such as leadership, teamwork, confidence, and resilience, qualities that will support them far beyond their time at school.

Assistant Principal, Mr. Khalil commented:

"We believe that learning happens everywhere, not just in the classroom. Challenge and Celebration Week is an opportunity for students to experience something new, develop character, and celebrate their successes. We are immensely proud of how all our students conducted themselves and embraced the week with enthusiasm and maturity."

The success of the week was only possible thanks to the tireless efforts of school staff, who supervised activities, coordinated logistics, and provided pastoral support, often during early starts and overnight stays. Special thanks also go to the support staff, trip leaders, and the external providers and venues who hosted our students.

The visiting group, which included 25 students from various year groups and 5 staff members, arrived at around 9.30am and were greeted warmly by our school community. Towards the end of Period 1, each French student was paired with a TSA student, giving them the chance to socialise during break time and experience British school life by attending lessons in Periods 2 and 3.

To further enhance the cultural exchange, our Head of Languages, Mrs Harrison, recently attended a civic event at Skipton Town Hall where she supported as a translator and played a key role in building strong relationships between the two towns. Her involvement was instrumental in helping to foster the warm and welcoming atmosphere that defined the visit.

Before departing, our French guests enjoyed a lunch generously provided by the Rotary Club – our sincere thanks go to them for supporting this important international partnership.

The visit was a fantastic opportunity for both Skipton Academy and Erquinghem-Lys students to connect, learn from each other, and share in a day of language, culture, and friendship. We look forward to continuing this valued exchange in the future.



Our biggest ever Bronze DofE cohort









This summer marked a significant milestone for The Skipton Academy as the school proudly celebrated its largest ever cohort of Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) participants. Over 30 students committed to the nationally recognised award scheme, which promotes independence, resilience, teamwork, and personal growth among young people.

The Bronze DofE Award challenges students to complete four key sections: Volunteering, Physical, Skills, and a two-day expedition. Each element requires sustained effort and commitment, encouraging students to step outside their comfort zones and develop important life skills along the way. From volunteering in local charity shops and youth clubs, to learning new creative or practical skills and taking part in sports and fitness, students demonstrated dedication and perseverance throughout the programme.

The highlight of the award for many is the expedition, and this year's Bronze group completed a two-day route that began in Grassington and concluded in Bolton Bridge, walking through some of the most picturesque but physically demanding terrain the Yorkshire Dales National Park has to offer. The journey tested their ability to navigate using maps and compasses, set up camp independently, cook meals outdoors, and work effectively as a team — all while carrying heavy rucksacks and managing their own time and pace.

What made this year's expedition particularly remarkable was the extreme weather conditions. The students undertook their walk during a July heatwave, with temperatures soaring well above seasonal averages. Despite the intensity of the heat, all participants showed outstanding determination, resilience, and a positive attitude throughout the two-day challenge. Their ability to remain focused, support one another, and persevere under such conditions is a true credit to their character.

The success of this year's programme would not have been possible without the commitment of staff volunteers, who gave up their time to support the students in their preparation and throughout the expedition. Their guidance, encouragement, and safeguarding support ensured that the experience was not only successful, but also safe and enjoyable.

We look forward to continuing to grow our DofE programme in the years ahead, providing more students with the opportunity to achieve this prestigious award and develop skills that will benefit them for life.

Curriculum Focus: Art

Both KS3 and KS4 Art students have soared this year, especially within the last few months. In this time frame alone Y10 students have completed two 'sustained' (ten hour) pieces, demonstrating a breath of skills and progress gained from their disciplined approach to the GCSE course.





Y9 students are in the midst of making full use of the kiln and clay materials to create their 'clay monsters', inspired by the work of James De Rosso and our 'Sea Creatures' project. Lots of our students have chosen the Art GCSE as one of their pathways for the next two years. This project has set them up with greater sculptural knowledge, ahead of the demanding course. Other students will go into Challenge and Celebration week having just had their 'last ever Art lesson', and what a fun final piece to go out on.



The Dales Cup – A Year of Growth and Achievement

The Dales Cup has been a tremendous success for TSA this year. Now in its second year, our students have gone from strength to strength, winning twice as many competitions as in the previous year. This is a clear indication that sporting performance across the school is on an upward trajectory, reflecting the dedication of both students and staff.

Looking ahead, The Dales Cup will continue into the next academic year, offering students the opportunity to compete across a wide range of sports. This platform will further support the development of their skills, competitive spirit, and teamwork.

Swimming Success Continues

We are incredibly proud to celebrate the achievements of one of our dedicated student swimmers, who recently competed at the Swim England North East Regional Long Course Championships. The event, held across two weekends in April and May at the John Charles Centre for Sport in Leeds, saw some of the best swimmers from across the region come together to compete at a high level.

Our student qualified for all three breaststroke distances – 50m, 100m, and 200m – and delivered outstanding performances across the board, reaching the finals in each event. In a particularly exciting race, he claimed gold in the 50m breaststroke, finishing with an impressive time of 37.66 seconds.

His commitment to training continues as he now sets his sights on the next stage of competition. He is currently preparing for the Yorkshire Short Course Championships in October, where he has already qualified for seven events, and the North East Regional Short Course Championships in November, where he has secured qualification for six events so far.

We wish him the best of luck as he continues to train and compete! William is a fantastic role model of perseverance and sporting excellence to other students at The Skipton Academy.
